

Know the Facts

More than 6,000 teens age 15-20 died in 2002 from underage drinking related causes.

25% of teen drivers killed in 2003 had a blood alcohol concentration of .08 or greater. A BAC of .08 is the level which all states define drunk driving.

During a typical prom weekend in 2004, 46% of traffic deaths of 15-20 year olds were alcohol related. That year, 2,223 teens died in alcohol related traffic accidents.

28% of the 15-20 year old drivers who were killed in auto accidents in 2005 had been drinking.

Drivers are less likely to wear a seatbelt if they have been drinking. In 2006, 64% of young drivers involved in fatal crashes who had been drinking were not wearing a seatbelt.

In 2007, about 67% of alcohol-related driving fatalities were drivers with blood alcohol concentration of .08 or more. Approximately 17% were passengers riding with the drunk drivers.

2,739 drivers between the ages of 15 and 20 died in motor vehicle crashes in 2008, down 13.7% from 3,714 in 2007.

Males are more involved in teenage drinking and driving than females, while the percentage of female driving is also on the rise.
